- Extensive roof repairs
- New flooring in the narthex
- Replacement of a damaged lamppost in the south parking lot (another damaged lamppost still needs to be addressed)
- Installation of directional signage at the front and north doors
- Beautification of our trash & recycle dumpster area currently with fencing, soon to have conifers (shrubbery) surrounding the fencing for even more curb appeal (see Page 19).

And now... we have broken ground for the new

pavilion, and no time too soon! Again, thanks to the continued donations from our ever so generous congregation; thanks also to everyone's support of the different FUNdraising efforts and just your faithful giving throughout! The expected completion will be before our upcoming Vacation Bible School.

However, with a large facility and spacious grounds around it, there is, of course, always maintenance and projects to be worked on. The Board of Trustees has been looking at the most pressing issues and prioritized them according to their urgency. Soon, the parking lot will need to be resealed, the carpeting in the north hallway replaced with the new planking as we have in the narthex, and there are other projects just waiting in the wings after that. The Trustees have been gathering quotes and pricing from various contractors to address these issues.

As you can imagine, these jobs quite exceed the 2024 building & maintenance budget. That's why we are creating a separate line item, "**church care projects**", and are asking everyone to prayerfully consider one-time or ongoing contributions. We need to immediately address the downed lamppost in the south parking lot and replace it with a new one, which will cost \$7,000. The decaying threshold at the north entrance needs to be fixed, and the door itself must be made ADA compliant (electronic/mechanically assisted opening for the disabled). Your generous donations can make this happen sooner rather than later.

God bless you as we all work together in keeping His house functional and beautiful for many years to come!

... is observed this year on June 20 in the Northern Hemisphere because of the Leap Year. Today, the observation isn't as popular as it was in ancient times throughout Europe, the British Isles, China, Egypt, North Africa and Scandinavia.

What does the summer solstice mean? It is the day when the sun is at its furthest point from the equator, resulting in the longest day of the year. The word "solstice" originates from the Latin word solstitium which means "sun-stopping." This is because, the point in the sky where the sun appears to rise and set, well it stops... then reverses direction after this day. Interesting, huh?

This just fascinated the ancients! Many celebrations took place on the summer solstice. The oldest one we know of took place in Egypt. At the Temple of Amen-Ra in Karnak back in 3700 B.C., a beam of light would illuminate a sanctuary in this temple's interior for about two or three minutes. This brightness would reach a peak and then start to subside. This spotlighting effect was so dramatic that the priests were able to calculate the length of the solar year with a high degree of accuracy.

Then we have the ever-popular Stonehenge in the Wiltshire plain of southwest England. This was built around 2800 B.C.E. by pre-Celtic people over a lengthy period. Most of us have either seen Stonehenge in person or in photos. It is made up of very large stone arches. Ancient tribes throughout Europe gathered here on the Summer Solstice. Why? If you stand in the center and face northeast along its axis, the 35-ton Heel Stone appears 256 feet away, marking the approximate place on the horizon where the sun rises on the Summer Solstice. Astronomers have recently discovered approximately two dozen other solar and lunar alignments that the ancients incorporated into the Stonehenge structure. Its actual purpose is still debated among astronomers and archeologists today.

The Chinese emperors of the past also observed the Summer Solstice. Their purpose was to stimulate the earthy, female **yin** forces. These rituals took place in The Forbidden City on the Altar of the Earth. Unlike the Round Mound (used for the Winter Solstice), this altar was square and had a staircase leading North, South, East and West. The Chinese did a human sacrifice as part of their ritual for the Summer Solstice also. The sacrificial victim was burned for the Winter Solstice. But the Summer Solstice sacrificial victim was buried. They believed by doing this, they were maintaining a healthy balance in the earth's natural rhythms.

The Winter Solstice is an occasion that is filled with hope, because the days begin to grow longer. But the Summer Solstice is just the opposite. It is filled with sadness, because the days begin to get shorter and filled with more darkness. Ironically, it is also a time for more warmth, abundance, and fertility.

Christmas and New Years celebrations can be found in the Winter Solstice and still are observed today in some form. But the ancient Summer Solstice rites have disappeared in society today. In the United States a few "New Age" groups still observe the Summer Solstice. The largest celebration in the United States is in Belfast, Maine. The Institute for Advanced Thinking (aka The World's Oldest Think Tank) has people coming from as many as twenty different states and five countries to camp out in tents and sleeping bags and rise at dawn to greet and worship the sun with prayers and ritual chants.

So why is June the most popular month for weddings? Is it due to good weather? Not really. The ancients felt that because the Summer Solstice marked the peak of the summer season, it also marked fertility and sexuality! It was usually during this time that many participated in symbolic marriage ceremonies.

In Sweden, each village chose a Midsummer Bride, who then selected a mock bridegroom. Young men from the village also took advantage of the season to choose temporary brides. In Sardinia, the summer solstice couples were called "Sweethearts of St. John," and the celebration involved pots of sprouting wheat and barley that symbolized a link between human sexuality and the fertility of nature.

But these marriage rituals were not just play-acting. Their purpose was to make the crops grow and the flowers bloom.

Since the Summer Solstice was the point where the days were now going to get shorter and darker, many of the ancient rite intentions were to postpone the sun's decline by celebrating life and fertility, or to mourn its passing. Not only was midsummer a time for weddings, ironically it was also popular for funerals. Weddings and funerals were both seen as moments of transformation, when energy was released, and Heaven and Earth were momentarily reunited.

June 14th is Flag Day!

Going back to the American Revolution, rebels each fought under their own individual flags (or colonies or local militia). The first real national flag was referred to as the "Grand Union Flag" and was first flown on New Year's Day in 1776 to celebrate the Continental Army's formation. It had thirteen stripes of red and white that represented the thirteen original colonies. It also had a square with crosses of St. George and St. Andrew to represent Great Britain, because some still hoped that the colonies could reconcile with England.

The Continental Congress did not adopt an official design for a national flag until June 14, 1777, approximately eleven months after the Declaration of Independence was signed. Tradition says that Betsy Ross is credited with making the original thirteen star and thirteen stripe banner. But there are several contradictory theories to this.

Some also claim that John Paul Jones (an American Naval Hero) and Francis Hopkinson (one signer of the Declaration of Independence) are attributed to our flag's creation. When Kentucky and Vermont were admitted to the Union in 1794, there were fifteen stars and But in 1818, Congress stripes. voted to restore the flag to its original thirteen stripes and just add a new star for each new If they had kept adding state. stripes for states, imagine just how large this flag would be!

In 1959, Alaska and Hawaii were the 49th and 50th states to be added.

The first Flag Day celebration didn't take place until June 14, 1861, almost 100 years after its original design was adopted. William T. Kerr (from Pittsburg, PA) is recognized as the person who created Flag Day. He began his efforts as a schoolboy and continued through adulthood. He lobbied government and did everything to bring Flag Day to the American public's attention.

President Woodrow Wilson first proclaimed June 14 as "Flag Day" in 1916. President Calvin Coolidge issued a similar proclamation in

1927. But you know how SLOW the government is! Flag Day didn't really officially become a holiday until President Harry Truman said so in 1949.

Pennsylvania is the only state that observes "Flag Day" as a legal holiday. All other states acknowledge its importance by displaying flags on homes, and public places. Other ways "Flag Day" is observed is through flag raising ceremonies, reciting the Pledge of Allegiance (written by James B. Upham and Francis Bellamy in 1892), and singing "The Star -Spangled Banner" or other patriotic songs.

Many schools hold programs with the purpose of instilling American pride in the flag and in our country.

Some people resent the commercialization of our flag on products. Others don't and feel wearing a flag design displays patriotic pride in America.

It was on June 14, 1777, the Continental Congress replaced the British symbols of the Grand Union flag with the new design that featured the thirteen white stars in a circle on a field of blue and the thirteen red and white stripes. This is the flag claimed to be made by Philadelphia seamstress, Betsy Ross, but there is no real proof. The stars represent the constellation of the States rising in the West. The blue background stood for the vigilance, virtues of perseverance, and justice. The stars were in a circle to represent the perpetuity of the The thirteen stripes Union. stood for the thirteen original colonies. Red symbolized the formed newlv country's defiance and daring. White symbolized purity and liberty.

The American flag is considered a symbol of patriotism and dedication to American ideals. It is one of the oldest national emblems... even older than Great Britain's Union Jack. The flag's appearance has been changed 26 times throughout history. This was

done usually to accommodate adding new states. The Easton Area Public Library in Pennsylvania claims to have the very first "Stars and Stripes" predating Betsy Ross' flag and others by a year. They say it was first displayed on July 8, 1776, during a public reading of the Declaration of Independence. It was thought to be made by a group of women from Easton (not one woman!). This flag is 8 feet long and 4 feet wide.

Flag Day is also a time to teach about flag etiquette. The flag should only be allowed to fly after sunrise and taken down before sunset. When it is raised or lowered, it must not touch the ground or the deck of a ship. The flag must be saluted by all that are present. When the flag is placed at half-mast for the dead, it must be hoisted first to the top of the staff, then lowered into place.

When the flag passes by on parade, spectators should stand if they are seated, stop if they are walking and remove hats (if wearing them) giving the flag their full attention. Nothing should ever be placed on the flag or attached to it! And the actual flag should never be used for decoration or advertising purposes.

The American flag is always placed to the left of other flags, from the viewer's perspective.



Oh how we enjoyed your scriptural insight, your humor-filled musings and your heaven-inspired, down-to-earth advice for our 'everydays'! We will surely miss your **'Reflections'**, Danny, and thank you for so many great contributions to *The Wyoming Messengers* through the years!





The inspiration for Father's Day was Mother's Day. So... if you are asked, which came first, Mother's Day or Father's Day... it's Mother's Day! Women came before men on this one.

Sonora Smart Dodd (Spokane, Washington) was listening to a Mother's Day sermon in her church and thought silently to herself that fathers needed the same sort of recognition also.

Sonora's own mother died in 1898. She was one of six children. Her father raised his children alone after his wife's death. She felt that her father deserved some recognition. She began working through Protestant churches and local groups in the Spokane area to promote this holiday. She decided that the third Sunday in June would be the day and, instead of a carnation (like Anna Jarvis proclaimed for Mother's Day), Sonora said everyone should wear a rose for Father's Day. She circulated a petition among ministers and church organizations. The first Father's Day observance took place in churches and was like the Mother's Day celebration.

The churches also used Father's Day to promote the masculine side of Christianity and to remind men (who might become fathers) and all fathers of their obligation to look after their families' spiritual welfare.

Sonora Dodd then formed a committee to promote the new church celebration by getting political endorsements, answering questions from around the country and putting on local celebrations. Although she did a lot of work, the idea of a day for fathers did not catch on as quickly as Mother's Day did.

By 1920, Father's Day had disappeared from the American social calendar and Mrs. Dodd had moved on to other interests. After studying at the Art Institute of Chicago and working as a fashion designer in Hollywood, she came home to Spokane in the 1930's. At that time, she resumed her campaign for Father's Day. By this time, the holiday (celebrated only in churches) was 25 years old. Suddenly, there was a renewed interest and Father's Day got a little boost (at least in Eastern Washington State). The rest of the United States wasn't so enthused and took it as just another excuse for a holiday, especially when it came to the commercial issues. After all, what did men want with sentimental things like flowers, gifts, and greeting cards?

But guess who came charging to the rescue? The Associated Men's Wear Retailers of New York City took on the challenge of getting a Father's Day in this country (not out of the goodness of their hearts, more their pocketbooks. They knew the commercial potential!)

In 1938, they set up The National Council for the Promotion of Father's Day. The council worked with florists, tobacconists, stationers, and men's clothiers across the United States to promote Father's Day. Their slogan? "Give Dad Something to Wear!"

President Calvin Coolidge had originally recommended that Father's Day become an official observance in 1924. But it took years...I mean YEARS until 1972 when President Richard Nixon signed a proclamation proclaiming the third Sunday in June as Father's Day.

Unfortunately, Sonora Smart Dodd died in 1978 at the age of 96, and only lived to see her holiday celebrated for a few years. Today, the Father's Day Council estimates that this observance brings in approximately \$1 billion a year in retail sales.

If you are like me, when you hear a particular oldie song, a classical piece, or jazz number that you really like and just have to get in your musical library collection, you pursue that recording to the ends of the earth. Searching for the recording "back in the day" was an arduous quest and went something like this.

In the late '60's, I heard on the TV a really cool opening musical number on the TV show "Breakfast Time." I went to the Merchandise Mart on Wilmington's Governor Printz Boulevard and entered Poole's Appliance where the guy there (Richard) had quite a variety of records for sale. I told him I was looking for a piece I heard on TV but didn't know the title. He asked me to hum a few bars which I did. Surprisingly, he immediately recognized what was being sought. "That's the Bugler's Holiday by Leroy Anderson, I have the album right here" he stated. "Hey, thanks Richard!" He also introduced me to the Phase Four stereo recordings which literally featured movement (from right speaker to the left) so parades and bull fights came to life right in your own living room. Quadraphonic sound, don't vou know.

One Saturday back in '73, I was cleaning my apartment (well, wonders never cease) and I had the classical music station (WFLN, Philadelphia) on the radio. On Saturday mornings from 11:30 to noon was a program featuring world famous marches; I loved that show and really liked the always played final march at the program's end. I called up the radio station and talked to the DJ and inquired as to the title of the closing march. "Oh, that's from an album called "Fiedler's Favorite Marches" called Strike Up the Band by George Gershwin. It is performed by the Boston Pops under the baton of maestro Arthur Fiedler." I jotted it down and thanked him.

I began the search the following weekend. I drove into Wilmington to the Dry Goods - nada. Up on Orange Street to a record store, nope. Hmm, lets try the Tri-State Mall on Naaman's Road; no luck. The Concord Mall, a bust. The following weekend I drove up into Pennsylvania to the Granite Run Mall on Route 1 - success! I happily drove home with my precious cargo; couldn't wait to put the LP on the stereo's turntable and have a beer. I spent a lot of time and put beaucoup miles on my Pontiac's odometer in search of that march, I was going to enjoy this listening experience.

One day at work, some guys were yammering about the song "Hot Rod Lincoln " (1972) and really enjoyed Commander Cody and His Lost Planet Airmen's rendition of the song but were mistakenly stating that that group was the originator of the number. The song was written and performed by Charlie Ryan and The Timberline Riders (1960) and I heard it in a mountain community in Martinsburg, West Virginia in '62. I couldn't find the recording in Wilmington so I ran up mom's phone bill in the successful effort of locating the 45 record on the Four Star label in the Martinsburg area record shop. Another arduous task in finding hard to locate records.

So, you get the picture. I'd pursue a particular recording until it was located and purchased. When I moved to Wyoming, I could be found browsing around the Wilmington Dry Good store's record sales located across the highway from the old Roses department store. I befriended a woman who managed that department and found out she gets a new catalog of classical music records every month. She would give me the month-old catalog so I could call her and order anything in the old listing. Things were getting somewhat easier in expediting the acquisition of sought classical albums. When I heard something new on the radio that just had to be in my collection, I had to listen to the radio guy at the musical piece's conclusion and get the title, performing orchestra, and conductor.

I've written numerous essays for our church's newsletter expressing my hesitancy in embracing technology improvements. I'll always be behind the curve in accepting those "improvements". That dumb microwave oven was in my home for six months before I got within five feet of its gross existence. I expected anatomically attached parts to wither and fall to the floor. Thankfully, I'm still all together. Now, many years later, I grudgingly give the oven thing a little love thanks to the bag of popcorn that emanates from within in less than two minutes. The cell phones, can't stand them but I do understand their usage for emergency calls and kid tracking. I believe the cell phone, though, has done a dis-service to young people as to knowing how to communicate and how to interact with others; you know, eye ball to eye ball conversations where body language and voice inflection are


on display. We know a couple that will check your statements in dinner conversations for accuracy with "Hey Google...". I got one for you: "Hey Google, #\$%^&*@#^\$%". BJ and I would be out to dinner and see a young dating couple sitting next to each other but they might as well have been worlds apart; whatever they were doing on their phones seemed more important than speaking with each other. What's this world coming to?

Then there's the computer. I worked in a laboratory a while back and, after four o'clock, we'd perform calculations on our day's completed work. It didn't take long to understand what our calculations were telling us and they really helped in rounding out a technician. But when the computer was introduced into the system, all test sheets were turned over to one person to tabulate lab results and the techs were released from that responsibility. It came to a point where techs did not know how to do the calcs or what the significance of their testing was in the "big picture". Ah yes, progress.

I have finally warmed up to the computer, though. There is one aspect of having a computer that I really appreciate that addresses and eliminates those days of difficulties previously noted about searching for recorded music. We have four Bose radios downstairs that are tuned into WSCL 89.5 FM (Salisbury) or WRTI 91.7 FM (Temple Radio). Now, if I hear something I like, I go to the computer and Google the radio station website and locate the day's playlist. Long story short, once the title of the number being played is known, it's ordered and Amazon sends the message that the order has been received and will be shipped within three days. In five minutes, the task is completed before the musical number on the radio is over - voilà! No more record-shop hopping and hours spent seeking new recordings. You can't beat that; what a great feature! Oh yeah, all my Christmas and clothes shopping is 95% accomplished on the computer. I used to love Christmas shopping at the malls; no more though.

In summary, it took a lot of patience and will power to locate records over a twenty-fiveyear period (1961-'86) when 660 LPs were acquired. From '86 to the present, the Van Kavelaar music library has expanded with the purchase of 875 CD's, thanks mainly for the ability to shop online. Quite an eclectic array of artists ranging from Beethoven to Alice Cooper, Charlie Pride to Sarah Brightman, Duane Eddy to Eddie Fisher, and so on. I guess the computer isn't all that bad!







- 10. Thou shalt be acquainted with Sunday school classes in case questions arise.



Greeters and Ushers are the "first contact" with the congregation for many people who visit on Sunday morning. The number one question visitors want answered is: "Is this a friendly congregation?" They start forming their answer based in large part on how welcoming and helpful the greeters and ushers of the church are.
