The Jews were anticipating a Messiah, but Jesus was not what they expected. What the religious leaders orchestrated to be Jesus' end instead changed the world forever. This historic film is produced, staffed, crewed, and performed by Deaf producers, creators, actors, and production crew members. JESUS: A Deaf Missions Film is the first feature film about Jesus

in American Sign Language, using native signers to bring the story of Jesus to life from a Deaf perspective.


The film includes a musical soundtrack and English subtitles.







A Deaf Perspective

In Mark 7: 32 – 37a, the townspeople bring a deaf man to Jesus to be saved. They want to see the miracle for themselves. This man, because he is deaf, in the times that he is living cannot own property, cannot earn money, and cannot strive for the life that is common at that time. Jesus did not heal the man in public, nor did he want the healing to be announced. Jesus took the man aside, away from the eyes of those who had brought him. He ends the man's deafness, in private, so that he can claim his rightful place in society. As he does so, he shouts, "Ephphatha!" which means, "Be

opened!" The interpretation of this passage by hearing people is that Jesus has commanded the man's ears to be opened so that he can hear. But, Jesus did not want the

The interpretation of worshipers are Deaf is quite different. They see



The Master of Melody

Just as there are arguments about who is the best baseball player, movie actor, singer etc., the argument can also be found in the world of composers. When I was in my teens, I learned the lesson when engaging in the debate on just who was the best baseball player, Mickey Mantle, Willie Mays, Hammerin' Hank Aaron, or Ted Williams. Arguments can be made for each of these guys and others. The learned lesson was not to argue about who was the best, but to pick your favorite player, root for him, and be happy. Me? Somewhere in the attic is a box full of Mickey Mantle memorabilia. Kids today know nothing about the Mick.

As for composers, who's the best? Bach, Beethoven, Mozart, Brahms, Schumann, the list goes on. I couldn't say who the greatest is, but I can tell you who my favorite is. We have ninety CD's and ten LP's of his compositions upstairs in my music room (Mancave # 1 according to BJ) and boy do I crank up the volume when listening to his music.

But first, check out what some of his critics had to say. One critic states he is "... surely no ordinary talent, but rather, an inflated one, obsessed with posturing as a man of genius, and lacking all discrimination and taste." In general, said one Vienna critic, his music "...scorns logic, wallows in torpor and, time and again, collapses in dissonant convulsions." Another negative criticism pertaining to one much-loved work, Romeo and Juliet, was said to feature music that "sounds rather like scratching a glass plate with a sharp knife." Another slam. His music "...sounds like nothing so much as a horde of demons struggling in a torrent of brandy, the music growing drunker and drunker." That review pertained to the 4th movement of his Symphony # 5 (my favorite), a wonderful thunderous finale in true Romantic Era fashion. The last time I saw this symphony performed it was ...

On a cold January evening a few years ago, we went to Verizon Hall in Philadelphia with some friends for a performance of his Symphony # 5 by the Philadelphia Orchestra. After the conclusion of the symphony, we were walking down the crowded staircase that led folks to the parking garage and Broad Street. In front of us was a young guy (an athlete would be my guess) talking to his girlfriend who probably had to drag him to the performance in the first place. He was amazed at what he heard. "Boy, you talk about team work!" he kept repeating. Ninety musicians hitting their notes seamlessly on the symphony's rousing conclusion of the fourth movement was something to audibly behold: I think the Philadelphia Orchestra won over at least one new fan that evening.

OK, I now reveal my favorite composer, (bugle trill, please!) "May I present to you the Master of Melody, **Pyotr Ilyich Tchaikovsky** (7 May 1840 – 6 Nov 1893). He was a Russian composer during the Romantic period (1820-1900) and was the first Russian composer whose music would make a lasting impression internationally. (Choke on that, you critics!) He wrote some of the most popular concert and theatrical music in the current classical repertoire including the ballets Swan Lake and The Nutcracker, the 1812 Overture, First Piano Concerto, Violin Concerto, The Romeo and Juliet Overture-Fantasy, six symphonies, and the opera Eugene Onegin.

Pertaining to the solo part in the Violin Concerto, critic Eduard Hanslick wrote "...the violin is no longer played, it is yanked about, it is torn asunder, it is beaten black and blue." His grand conclusion: "Tchaikovsky's Violin Concerto confronts us for the first time with the hideous idea that there may be musical compositions whose stink one can hear."

I believe my liking of Tchaikovsky began when I was a little kid. Mom and Dad would have the classical station on the old Philco radio. Dad wanted complete silence when *The Nutcracker* was on the ancient tubed radio. Well, I listened, and that planted the seed in me that would flourish throughout my life. Long story short, our classical music library consists of over four hundred CD's and one hundred LP's.

Strange to say, Tchaikovsky, as a composer, is much more fully understood and appreciated by the masses of music lovers than he is by the musical sophisticates of the world. The latter tend to exaggerate his faults, which admittedly are many, by emphasizing

Tchaikovsky's lack of subtlety, his hysteria, and his self-pity. In doing this, they minimize or overlook the very great virtues and talents that the composer possessed – his honesty, his directness, his wonderful melodic gift, and his extraordinary sense of climax. These are not small gifts, and the greatest music of any period possesses them.

While listening to the classical/jazz station WRTI awhile back, the DJ asked the audience what we thought was Tchaikovsky's own favorite written score. We had time to ponder because he'd give the answer at the hour's end. But we were informed, and I was really surprised, when he offered that Tchaikovsky's least favorite composition was his own 1812 Overture (now an international favorite). It pained him deeply each time he penned a note to the score, go figure. Well as to the upcoming answer, I played some Tchaikovsky music in my head and finally (correctly) guessed The Serenade for Strings. I had some reservations on my selection because Tchaikovsky was a traditional Romantic period composer who loved full orchestration and was free to employ every instrument of the orchestra for the upcoming musical fireworks at finale time. Bombastic was a term associated with him. But the Serenade for Strings was performed by just a small string section (five or six musicians.)

This Spring, WRTI conducted the Spirit of 76 Countdown. Listeners were asked to submit the names of their favorite classical pieces and, at the contest's end, a list of the top 76 favorite classical pieces was established. Tchaikovsky had five pieces selected and his 5th Symphony was his highest rated composition at number 36. FYI, number 4 was Beethoven's Symphony 5, number 3 was Beethoven's Symphony 7, number 2 was Dvorak's Symphony 9, The New World Symphony, and number 1 was Beethoven's Symphony 9. If you're interested in the Spirit of 76 results, Google "Spirit of 76 countdown results."

What a wonderful art, music. You can't see it, hold it, or touch it. Sculptors and painters must be extremely envious of music composers. A piece of paper with notes on it. But the power of music is unmistakable. Proud occasions such as coronations and weddings employ music for the event; men would march to war to their nation's hymns and battle cries. A wonderful osmosis of sorts occurs when you "really get into the music" while it, in turn, gets into you as it permeates your soul.

Without question, the music of Tchaikovsky has attracted more novices to

music as an art than that of any other composer. Indeed, it is the impassioned love of his music by the novice that probably causes the violent reaction against Tchaikovsky by the more musically mature. The fine qualities in the composer's music are possessed to a very high degree, its rich orchestration, its logical music development, and its eloquent and natural emotional expression.

We've introduced our sons and others to *The Nutcracker* at Christmas time (I still go every year mainly for the loud music). Many young kids get exposure to his music due to their participation in the ballet as mice, gum drops, snowflakes, and soldiers. How many times have you heard the *1812 Overture* performed by the Boston Pops at the July 4th Celebration on the Charles River in Boston? At Fager's Island in Ocean City, MD, management plays the *1812 Overture* every day and times its playing to coincide with the cannon blasts of the music's conclusion to a breath-taking, dazzling sunset.

According to a survey by Bachtrack, Tchaikovsky came in at number 7 in their list of most-often-performed composers for 2018. With 214 recordings listed for his *Piano Concerto No. 1* at ArkivMusic.com as well as 180 each for the *Violin Concerto* and *Romeo and Juliet*, it would seem that Tchaikovsky has had the last laugh, although the laughter may have been through a few tears.

Upstairs in the Mancave #1 are framed photos of Pyotr Ilyich Tchaikovsky, Ludwig van Beethoven, Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart, Robert and Clara Schumann, Franz Liszt, Richard Wagner, and David Zinman (Baltimore Symphony Orchestra), and a good sounding stereo system I might add. Just like the photos of the great baseball, football, and ice hockey stars on the wall across from the Composers Wall upstairs, Pyotr Ilyich Tchaikovsky, the Master of Melody, has certainly met my requirements to attain super-star status and most valuable composer recognition.



Lloyd Douglas, the famous author, one day happened into the studio of a friend, an elderly violin teacher. This man had a plain and simple wisdom that was always refreshing.

"What's the good word today?"
Douglas inquired. The old man laid down his violin and struck the tuning fork that hung from a silken cord. "That, my friend, is 'A'. It was 'A' yesterday; it will be 'A' tomorrow, and it will be 'A' until the end of time. The soprano upstairs may warble off key; the tenor next door may be flat on his high notes; and the piano in the next room may be out of tune, but that, my friend, is 'A'."

When an orchestra is preparing to give a concert, every instrument must be tuned. Generally the pianist strikes 'A' and everyone tunes to that. After playing each main selection, the musicians carefully retune. If they neglect to do this, their music becomes discordant and unpleasant to hear.

Jesus was not in tune with the people of His day. He did not live and believe as so many of them did because He was attuned to the will of His Father. One day He told His disciples: "My food is to do the will of Him who sent me." (John 4:34).

This is the reason so many of His teachings seemed different and revolutionary. He taught that we should love our enemies; and that is not easy, because it is more natural to love our friends and hate our enemies. He also said, "It is more blessed to give than to receive."

(Acts 20:35) Most of us

(Acts 20:35). Most of us are more in tune with our human nature, which is inclined to be selfish rather than generous.

If we would be His faithful and obedient disciples, His perfect example is the 'A' to which we should tune our attitudes and actions. What a different word ours would be if everyone were tuned to the 'A' of our Lord's teaching and example.





Wyoming Church's Memorial Garden Is Always Open!

Our Memorial Garden, located on the East side of our Church property and surrounded by the Memorial Grove, is situated so as to catch the first rays of the morning Sun. The Memorial Garden is designed so that it easily, efficiently and permanently displays the messages that are inscribed on the various Memorial Garden Bricks that have been placed in the Garden over the last several years.

The opportunity to place Memorial Garden Bricks in the Garden is open to all at any time of the year. To begin the simple process you can start by picking up a Memorial Garden application form that can be found on the Memorial Garden Model located in the Narthex.

Fill out the one page application and return it to Terry Higgins or leave it with Renate in the Church Office. Upon the submission of your completed application, Terry will work with you to bring the process to completion and subsequent placement of the Memorial Garden Brick in the Garden.

"A Swale Of A Tale!"

Over the past few months, I have received some occasional queries regarding the large, well-vegetated depression that is located between the eastern edge of the Church's mowed meadow and the railroad tracks. These questions usually come about in discussions about how nice the meadow looks and how verdant the un-mowed depression looks.

Technically the un-mowed area in question is referred to as a swale and is a vital part of our Wyoming Church's Storm Water Management Plan (SWMP). The primary function of our SWMP's swale is to serve as a temporary receiving/holding basin for catastrophic amounts of precipitation received over short periods of time.

The sides and contour of the swale's basin are constructed so that it will hold large amounts of precipitation to be released over a long period of time versus all at once. This slower release is accomplished by the raised lip at the southern end of the swale.

One of the Church's environmental responsibilities is to maintain a viable

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
