## Some Thoughts... by Jack Freidel

Train children in the way they should go; when they grow old, they won't depart from it. - Proverbs 22:6




Did you know? Your next grocery bill, gas tank fill-up, restaurant check, coffee run, and online purchase can help our church raise money?

The Christmas Season is approaching fast - it is just about 10 weeks away. Soon, the smell of pine trees, baked pies and Christmas cookies will fill the air. Every radio station will be playing Christmas music and every store will be filled with Christmas decorations and toys.

It is time to start thinking about the **WUMC Giving Tree** which has become a cherished Christmas Tradition for many years here at the church because we love to bring smiles to many faces on Christmas morning, as young and old(er) folks and friends with disAbilities find presents under their Christmas tree. This year we will be sponsoring 60 children and 16 special needs adults.

The **Giving Tree** will be in the Narthex (with tags) from Sunday, November 24<sup>th</sup> to

Friday, December 6th. All gifts must be brought to the church and placed under the tree by Sunday, December 8<sup>th</sup>. You do not have to wait until December 8<sup>th</sup> to bring your gifts, you can bring them any time and place them under the tree.

From there, the church elves will take over and make sure that all the gifts will go to all the right families.

Each ARC special needs person will receive two gifts, which our elves will wrap and place in a nice bag for them.

Each of our children will receive three gifts. One item will be some type of clothing or pajamas and the other two items will be toys or books.

Each tag will be for a female (pink) or a male (blue) and will have their age, clothing size and one wish item gift that the child or special needs adult would like. If you choose to purchase for a special needs adult, "ARC" will be noted on the code line. Please remember that if you have an ARC person and it says size 10 pants, that would be an adult size 10.

Please purchase just what is requested or as close as you can get to the item that is asked for. We all like to do more, but if it says "an outfit", please limit it to one outfit and not two or three. It is important that each sibling gets the same number of gifts. You can take as many tags as you like from the tree.

Please **do not** wrap the gifts. When you place a gift under the tree, **make sure that you tape the tag or secure it somehow to the gift.** We need to know which family this gift goes to. If you would like to add a gift box or bag with the gift, that will be greatly appreciated.

Each family will receive the gifts along with wrapping paper, tape, bows, and tags so that the parents or caregivers can take an active part by wrapping their children's or dependents' gifts.

Remember that Christmas is a joyful time of giving, and those who are less fortunate are ever so grateful.



## The Wonders of Autumn

My favorite season is the Fall where God shows off by providing for us a spectacular display of colors as the leaves of trees around us transition from green to a mixture of red, purple, orange, and yellow. How awe inspiring!

I used to go camping in the Autumn in the mountains north of Elk Grove, PA. One of the highlights of the camping trip was witnessing the unbelievable changing of the coloring of leaves. The attempt to describe the breath-taking coloring of the tree's leaves is beyond the capability of this writer.

It should be mentioned that weather affects the color intensity of leaves. Temperature, light, and water supply have an influence on the degree and duration of Fall colors. Low temperatures above freezing will form anthocyanin which produces bright reds in maples. However, early frost will weaken the brilliant red coloring. Rainy and overcast days tend to increase the intensity of Fall colors. The best time to enjoy the autumn display would be on a clear, dry, and cool day.

The change in colors of leaves is the result of chemical processes that occur in the tree as the seasons change from Summer to Winter. During the Spring and Summer, the leaves have served as factories where most of the food necessary for the tree's growth are manufactured. This food making process takes place in the leaf in numerous cells containing chlorophyll which makes the leaf green. This extraordinary chemical absorbs from sunlight the energy that is used in transforming carbon dioxide and water (our old friend photosynthesis) to sugars and starch.

Along with the green pigment are yellow to orange pigments, carotenes and xanthophyll pigments which, for example, gives the orange color to a carrot.

But in the Fall, because of the change in the length of daylight and decreasing temperatures, the leaves stop their food making process. The chlorophyll breaks down, the green color disappears, and the yellow to orange colors become visible and give the leaves part of their autumnal splendor.

At the same time, other chemical changes may occur which form additional colors through the development of red anthocyanin pigments. Some mixtures give rise to reddish and purplish fall colors of trees such as dogwoods and sumacs while others give the sugar maple its brilliant orange.

Autumn foliage of some trees show only yellow colors. Others, like many oaks, display mostly browns. The dead brown leaves of oaks may stay on the tree until growth starts again in the Spring. The two oaks in the field past the church's south parking lot are examples of this dead leaf retention. I run my Doberman in that field and always wondered why those brown oak leaves stayed attached to the tree thru winter; now I know.

Autumn leaves in vibrant hues are a beautiful part of the season but those leaves are also a vital part of keeping trees alive. Trees that have leaves that change colors in fall are deciduous and usually have broad leaves. Evergreen trees with needles which stay green to continue the photosynthesis process through Winter, are coniferous. The color palate for Autumn is awe inspiring. Leaves of oaks range from red to brown to russet; of hickories, golden bronze; of aspens, golden yellow; of dogwoods, purplish red; of beech, light tan; and of sourwood, crimson. Differing maples range from brilliant scarlet to orange red to glowing yellow.

Friends, take some time to enjoy the show God provides for us as Autumn settles in. Get a cup of coffee and take a drive along Route 9, free of the Route 13 hustle and bustle, where things are much calmer, serene, and visually stimulating. Enjoy the beauty of the change taking place before you but don't wait too long. The Wonders of Autumn last for a brief period.

Here are some comments about Autumn that are wonderful insights; what do you think?

Autumn teaches us the ending is as beautiful as the beginning.

The shear bliss of Autumn is the delight of watching leaves in their final dance.

Fall is the ending of one book but it always has a spectacular sequel.

Autumn isn't about falling into Winter. It's about dancing in the wind.

- Autumn is a sweet ending that brings hope and joy for a new bright beginning.
- I never think of Fall as an ending. It's a tree's colorful joyous dance into a new beginning.

## Fall is God's last gift before a dormant Winter and the anticipated rebirth in Spring.

Bette and I just came back from Ohio where my beloved sister Carol was laid to rest. I'm certain God welcomed Carol to her heavenly reward as her life on earth was geared toward raising seven children and helping others in a kind and loving way as a nurse and hospital chaplain.

Driving home from Ohio yesterday on I-70 through the mountains around Wheeling WV, God's colorful artwork that was splashed across the mountain sides fortified my belief that each of our lives travel the path parallel to that of the four seasons; that is, our journey from birth to death begins with the promises of Spring and ends in the dark and dreary Winter, but that rebirth in the new Spring in God's realm is what we all seek. Amen.

## Giant Monster Cookies!

#### **Ingredients:**

2 cups creamy peanut butter
2/3 cup butter, softened
1-1/3 cups sugar
1-1/3 cups packed brown sugar
4 large eggs, room temperature
2-1/2 teaspoons baking soda
1 teaspoon vanilla extract
1 teaspoon light corn syrup
6 cups old-fashioned oats
1 cup semisweet chocolate chips
1 cup milk chocolate M&M's

#### **Directions:**

I. In a large bowl, cream peanut butter, butter, sugar, and brown sugar until light and fluffy.

2. Beat in eggs, baking soda, vanilla, and corn syrup.

3. Add oats and mix well.

Stir in Chocolate Chips and M&Ms.
 Cover and refrigerate for about I hour.

6. Preheat oven to 350°.

7. Drop by  $\frac{1}{4}$  cup onto ungreased baking sheets, 3 inches apart

8. Bake 14 – 18 minutes until the edges are lightly browned.

9. Cool 5 minutes before removing from pans to wire racks to cool completely 10. Store in an airtight Container 11. Enjoy!!

## November 17<sup>th</sup> is Homemade Bread Day!

What a great day to try Italian Style Quick Bread

#### Ingredients:

3 C all-purpose flour
3 T sugar
I T baking powder
I/2 t salt
I T Oregano
2 T basil
I/4 C grated Parmesan Cheese
I egg
I C milk
I/3 C canola oil

#### Step 1: Mix Up the Batter

Start by combining your flour, sugar, baking powder and salt together in a large bowl. In another dish, whisk together your wet ingredients: egg, milk and oil. Add the wet ingredients to the dry ingredients and mix until just moistened. Don't overwork this quick bread batter!

When the batter is complete, transfer into a  $9 \times 5$ -inch loaf pan coated with cooking spray.

#### Step 2: Bake

To bake this bread, just pop it into a 350°F oven for 40 to 50 minutes. The bread is done when a toothpick inserted into the center comes out clean.

When the bread is baked, let it cool in its pan for 10 minutes. Then turn over and remove from the pan and let it finish cooling on a wire rack. Once cooled, slice and serve alongside soup, salad, or any dinner.

#### How to Customize This Recipe

You can switch up the baking vessel for this yeast-free bread. You can bake in an eightinch cast-iron skillet at 350°F for 45 to 50 minutes or prepare this bread as muffins. Just spoon into a greased muffin tin and bake at 350°F for 25 to 30 minutes - until a toothpick comes clean.

## What's Homemade Bread without Homemade Butter? November 17<sup>th</sup> is also Homemade Butter Day!

#### Ingredients:

I C Heavy Cream Cold Water

#### **Mixer Instructions:**

I. Pour cream into the bowl of a stand mixer using the whisk attachment, or use a mixing bowl and hand mixer. Begin beating the cream on a low speed, and gradually increase the speed as the mixture thickens. 2. After several minutes, whipped cream will form. Continue mixing. The whipped cream will start to yellow. After several minutes more the fat solids will separate from the liquids and you'll see clumps of butter fat quickly form, leaving the sloshing liquid buttermilk in the bottom of the bowl.

#### Mason Jar Instructions:

I. Pour heavy cream into the mason jar, filling it half-way full. Do not overfill past the half-way mark. Screw the lid on tightly so there are no leaks.

2. Shake the mason jar for approximately 5-7 minutes. After a few minutes, whipped cream will form. Keep shaking until you hear that a lump has formed inside, then shake an additional 30-60 seconds after that. You should clearly see that the fat solids have separated from the liquids. The amount of time it takes will depend on how vigorously you are able to shake the jar.

#### Rinsing, Flavoring, and Storing:

I. Strain the fat solids from the buttermilk using a fine mesh strainer or cheesecloth. You can reserve the buttermilk and save it for later use in recipes.

2. Pour cold water over the butter. Discard water and repeat rinsing 2 times more. Shape into a ball or any other shape (you can purchase butter molds for interesting designs).

3. At this point you have butter. You can add in things like salt, honey, and herbs to create flavored butters, or serve in its pure form as is.

Yet despite these record temperatures and long periods of near drought our Church's managed turf and mowed meadows were kept in very good condition by Jerry Wallace, our contracted landscape professional.

## Memorial Garden Bricks Receive Perpetual Care.

Some folks may not know that when the Memorial Garden was established a number of years ago, provision was made to establish a self-funded Memorial Garden Perpetual Care Fund. The financial mechanism is quite simple. Every time a Memorial Garden Brick is ordered and paid, a portion of that payment is placed in a special church account set aside just for the sole care of the Memorial Garden.

To my knowledge this Perpetual Care Fund has never been tapped. Lately during routine inspections of the Memorial Garden, I have noticed that a few - not all - of the Memorial Garden Bricks contain lettering that is not as sharp and distinct as it once was. A subsequent conversation with the Stone Mason resulted in a plan to meet onsite and rectify the situation.

Please continue to remember that the placing of a Memorial Brick in the Memorial Garden is an excellent way to honor the memory of a loved one or the memory of some one who has had a most positive impact on your life. 

The last thing to remember is that your child's story belongs to him and he should have control over it. Let your child tell his/her story in his/her own way; maybe draw pictures, act out a play for your family, or create a collage with pictures.




Calling *all* Creative Hands & Hearts ... and not only for Christmas!
