I (PR) am a huge fan of Christmas music (Pastor Lindsay is too!) The moment that the local radio station turns to its all-Christmas music format, I have in on in the car. Thanks to Amazon Music and IHeartRadio I have Christmas music of all sorts at my fingertips 24/7. Some days I like the classic sounds of Bing Crosby, Perry Como, and Ray Conniff, others I like the more modern sound of Pentatonix, while on others I listen to Handel's Messiah and other classical pieces. I love it all, and it really does make the season merry and bright.



In our canon of Christmas church music, my favorite song is probably "Hark! The Herald Angels Sing." The song was written in 1739 by Charles Wesley, the brother of the founder of the Methodist movement John Wesley. The Peninsula-Delaware Disaster Response and Recovery Team urgently needs your help.



Since the COVID-19 pandemic in 2020, our pool of trained Early Response Team (ERT) members has drastically diminished. These teams, typically composed of six to eight members skilled in various disaster recovery tasks, are crucial for effective disaster response. Currently, only two trained members remain in our Conference, severely limiting our ability to respond to emergencies.

We need more volunteers to step up and get trained. Basic ERT training is just 8 hours, with advanced courses taking 4 hours each. Training can be arranged at your church, and multiple churches can collaborate to host these sessions. Volunteers do not need to be church members but must align with our UMC beliefs.



next to mom seemed disappointed when mom put the box back down. "Buenos días, Señora!!" said Sam. She replied in perfect English "Good morning!" Sam pulled a \$50 bill from his pocket and lied to her that he found it blowing around in the parking lot and he didn't need it. "You can have it if you want.", Sam said. "Oh thank you very much!" she replied. "De nada. Have a good day and Feliz Navidad!!"

The next stop on Sam's agenda was the Dollar Tree out by Salisbury Road and Route 8. Sam enjoyed the giving of a small cash gift as long as it was spent for the right reason. As he strolled by the scented candle section, Sam crossed paths with a young mother, again with child in tow, who was comparing prices of items. "Good morning!", said Sam. Mommy (according to the boy at her side) cordially returned the greeting. Sam said he won some money at the casino (a lie) and she'd be welcome to have the \$50 bill he held in his hand. She gratefully accepted the offer and they happily wished each other a Merry Christmas and parted ways.

All in all, Sam visited four businesses that day and hopefully eased some financial concerns of shoppers. 

The WUNC Giving Tree has become a timehonored Christmas tradition, and it is up and decorated in the Narthex and filled with many wish tags from those who are less fortunate during this Holiday Season. Please help make their Christmas be a memorable one by taking a moment to look at the tags. Take one or two - there are plenty to choose from! The tags are labeled for a boy or a girl, along with their age and size. You will also see a code sign on the tag; the first number there is the 'family number', so if you are looking for a particular family, look for the same first number. We tried to hang all tags for one family close to each other.

If you see a tag labeled "ARC ADULT", this is a gift for one of our special needs persons. All but two are adults, so please carefully check the age and size specified.

You can place your gifts (unwrapped) under the tree anytime before December 8, 2024. All gifts must be returned by Sunday, December 8, 2024.

Please purchase ONLY what is on the tag or something that is closely related. If it is one item, please get one item only, because there are other siblings in the family, and we want to keep gifts equal for everyone. Please use your judgement for the smaller gifts like crayons and coloring books.

- Please do not wrap the gift. The elves need to see the gifts in order to put them with the correct family. If you include a box or gift bag, the elves will be greatly appreciate it!
- Please attach the tag to the gift so that the elves know what family to put it with. Without the tag, it is very hard to figure which gift goes where.
- ♦ You can place your gift under the tree anytime before December 8 the earlier the better, for the elves have a lot to do after receiving the gifts.

Christmas is a joyful and wonderful time to reach out and help others. Those who receive these gifts are so very grateful every year! It may not seem much to us, but it means everything to them.


We can make this happen by partnering with a beautiful organization called New Day Pregnancy Care Center.



Taking Out the Garbage

David Van Kavelaar Somehow, the term "garbage" found

its way into the national lexicon recently and

brought back memories of days (actually decades) gone by. Ah yes, it was...



Four-thirty in the morning, my wakeup time, so nineteen-year-old me could prepare for work. The green work shirt and trousers bought at Sears was the uniform of the day and, with bologna sandwiches in hand, I stumbled out the door and got into the '63 Bel Air and drove to Wilson Road where Jack and Joan lived. Upon arrival, Jack and I climbed into the powder blue garbage truck, named Little Barbie after his daughter, and off we'd go for the day's collection sites. Now, you must understand, this old Mack was a garbage truck, not a trash truck. Garbage cans were a rotted-out aluminum affair those days with some pulsating, glowing liquid at the bottom referred to as mung in the trade, the nastiest smelling concoction ever! That nasty liquid elevated the smell of buzzard puke to the essence of Chanel No. 5 in comparison to It was late 1966 and plastic "trash" bags weren't in vogue nor were plastic trash cans; you were lucky if customers put their slop in Acme bags before dumping the kitchen waste or pampers in the outside can.

Now, Jack was a good guy, was always smiling, and was a hard worker. He scrounged up customers and was no competition to the three garbage hauling giants in Wilmington: Aubria Hope, Walter Bandurski, and Stanley J. Twardus. These guys had fleets of trucks to service their vast clientele list; Jack had only the one beat up truck. Jack was well known in the development where his wife Joan lived before they married. I overheard Joan's mom telling neighboring wives, chatting "over the fence" while putting laundry out to dry don't you know, that her son-in-law was "quite the man" and her daughter was just ecstatic about it. They oohed and tee-heed and clucked over Jack's manliness: whatever!

Our easiest location for garbage pick-up was Alban Park in south Wilmington.

Row houses were a snap as a row of thirty homes could be serviced in less than twenty minutes. I had the garbage barrel rolling operation down pat and, as long as the alleys weren't broken up chunks of concrete, collection was rapid. I did OK, but there was this little black guy named Francis who was the talk of the trash trade. I never met him, but he was the A-Rod of garbage men, a gun for hire. This guy could move trash faster than anyone in the city; he was an unstoppable force as neither dogs, fences, nor garbage weight phased him. Pay him well and he would hump trash with lightning speed that put the rest of us to shame.

The worst place for garbage pick-up was Conestoga Farms up Route 202 just inside Pennsylvania. These homes were on acre lots and there was a good distance between home garbage can locations. One advantage of PA was that there was a dump one mile down the road from Conestoga Farms where Little Barbie's contents could be deposited in the landfill where Jack would pay the dump master fifteen bucks for the privilege of contributing to the PA landfill. The problem was that it was illegal for a Delaware hauler to empty his truck contents over the state line as it deprived Delaware of their landfill trash, and the fifteen dollars dump fee at the site. Now there was a PA county employee who'd sneak around in his government truck and look for illegal dumping; I kid you not. It made sense to Jack to try and get away with the criminal act of illegal garbage dumping because to drive back down Route 202, go through Wilmington, head south on Route 13 past the Wilmington airport near New Castle to deposit the truck's contents at the Black Cat Dump took two hours out of the work day. We got nailed one day at the PA dump and had to pay a \$75 or \$100 fine; a pretty steep price to pay. The whole thing reminded me of Alice's Restaurant; you know, the Arlo Guthrie album. It helps if you can remember the '60's.

It seemed Little Barbie would require maintenance every two weeks or so and, at 5 AM, we'd take the truck to Wadkins Motors in the seedy portion of Chester (PA) along Route 13 before I-95 was completed. It seemed to me that any stray dog in the tri-state area would wind up along the corridor from Wilmington to Philly right smack in the heart of Chester. Jack's rig was a cash cow for the mechanics there. We'd drop off the truck and walk a quarter mile or so to some greasy spoon all-night diner where we'd tank up on java and chat with the waitresses. Wadkins Motors would call the diner when their work was

completed. Mavis, a heavy-set gal who'd worked the midnight shift for ten years, would bellow: "Jack, she's done!" Paying the bill of twenty cents for two coffees and leaving a twenty-cent tip, off we'd go back to the mechanic's shop with those ever present eerie and darting dog shadows flitting between cars and alleys beneath dim and dingy street lamps. Darn dogs, I hoped they weren't conspiring to... well, never mind.

The disadvantages of the job were the gross smell to your clothing from the garbage barrel's mung drippings. Dogs were to be reckoned with also, especially the little sneaky ankle biters. Sometimes I had to stand inside the barrel until the owner would get the little crappy poodle back in the house. I wanted so much to put a steel tipped boot into Frenchy's rib cage and stomp the little undisciplined mutt into submission but those actions were not conducive to good clientele relations. There was no pepper spray available to my knowledge, and firing a .45 round into the canine's cranium did seem a little excessive. Another drawback of the job, once your "occupation" was known, was the way some would look at you (or maybe they just could smell you 25 yards away as you approached.)

Regardless of the clientele, women were unanimous in their desire to rid the kitchen of garbage. Having forgotten to get the trash out the night before, moms and housewives would rush to the door in their night shirts holding a bag of trash for me to deposit in the truck hopper. I kind of liked that aspect of the job. The households were still able to get by with one pay check then so the women hadn't been fully integrated into the work force yet. The moms and wives were awake before the others in the house busying themselves in the kitchen and preparing breakfasts and school lunches.

So, I was in the garbage hauling business from the fall of '66 to the spring of '67 earning \$2.75 per hour, not a bad wage then. It was hard work, especially in April and May when the garbage was wet from spring showers. Now when the trash men come to either of our homes today. I proudly state that I hauled garbage almost fifty years ago upstate and appreciated their work. To me, there is no stigma attached to their job. A couple plastic bottles of ice water is always offered to them should they so desire a cold drink on a steamy July and August day. I was talking with one trash quy in Fenwick Island about my past experiences. He said that my working on a garbage truck didn't affect my ability to rent a place by the ocean. I said we own the home, we're not renting. He looked at me, then our beach home (The Ocean Gypsy), and back at me again. Without saying a word, he nodded, hopped on the back of the trash truck, leaned over and waved so to be seen in the driver's side mirror and, as they proceeded north along the Ocean Highway, he flashed a big grin and gave me a thumbs up. You too, my friend!





Solar Power Task Force Update

The Solar Power Task Force continues to make progress towards the goal of having a solar power array here at Wyoming Church. The team plans to have two proposals to put forward to Church Council by January. One would be a roof mount, and the other would be a ground mount. An architect is currently looking over the blueprints of the Trusses and roof to be sure they can support a roof mount. The companies who previously submitted proposals are being asked to update the pricing for their proposals.

The task force team will be meeting in December to review the updated proposals and recommend one roof mount proposal and one ground mount proposal. These proposals will then be reviewed at a Trustees meeting in December for their approval. Providing a go ahead is given by the Trustees, it will be on to the Church Council.

The task force is pleased to have this opportunity to do our part in helping to take care this beautiful world The Lord has given us.


New Year - Next Bench!! Recycle Plastic for our 3rd Trex Bench.


Over recent months, we collected over 1,000 lbs

I had shoulder replacement surgery October 9. Frank and I are much appreciative to our church family for the many cards and notes sent and numerous calls and offers of assis-


